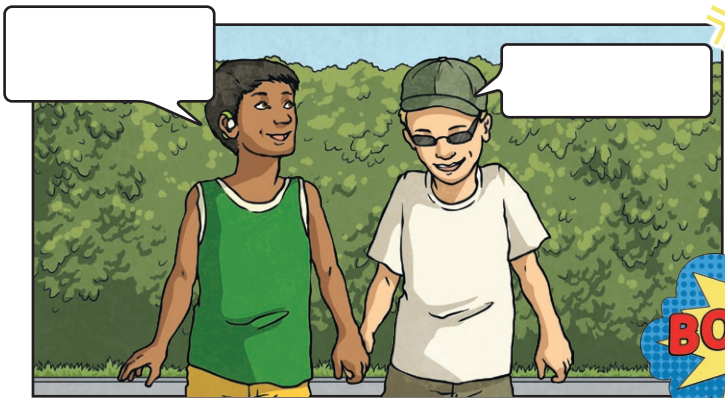


First Conversations

in Spanish

Use these phrases to create conversations between the characters. Then, ask a friend to act out the conversations with you.

English	Spanish	Notes
Hello!	¡Hola!	'H' is always silent in Spanish, (except when it's next to c), so the word is pronounced 'Ola'.
Good morning!	¡Buenos días!	The accent on 'í' indicates the stressed syllable, which means that you put more emphasis on that letter.
Good night!	¡Buenas noches!	'H' next to 'c' sounds like the English 'ch', like in the word 'chess'.
Goodbye!	¡Adiós!	The accent on 'ó' indicates the stressed syllable, which means that you put more emphasis on that letter.
See you later!	¡Hasta luego!	'H' is always silent in Spanish, (except when it's next to c), so the word is pronounced 'Asta'.
See you tomorrow!	¡Hasta mañana!	Letter 'ñ' sounds like 'ny' in English.
Pleased to meet you!	¡Encantado/a!	Use 'Encantado' (masculine) or 'Encantada' (feminine) depending on who is speaking (m/f).
What's your name?	¿Cómo te llamas?	'Ll' sounds like 'y' in English, like in the word 'yes'.
My name is...	Me llamo...	'Me' sounds like 'meh' in English.
Welcome.	Bienvenido/a.	Use 'Bienvenido' (masculine) or 'Bienvenida' (feminine) depending on the person you are talking to (m/f).
How are you?	¿Cómo estás?	The accents indicate the stressed syllables, which mean that you put more emphasis on those letters.
Good thanks, and you?	Bien gracias, ¿y tú ?	'C' in the word 'gracias' sounds like 'th' in English, so the word is pronounced 'grathias'.
Have a nice day!	¡Que tengas un buen día!	'Qu' sounds like 'k' in English and 'é' sounds like 'eh', so the word is pronounced 'keh'.
Where do you come from?	¿De dónde eres?	'De' sounds like 'deh' in English.
I come from...	Soy de...	The letters 'oy' together sound the same as in English like in 'boy'.
